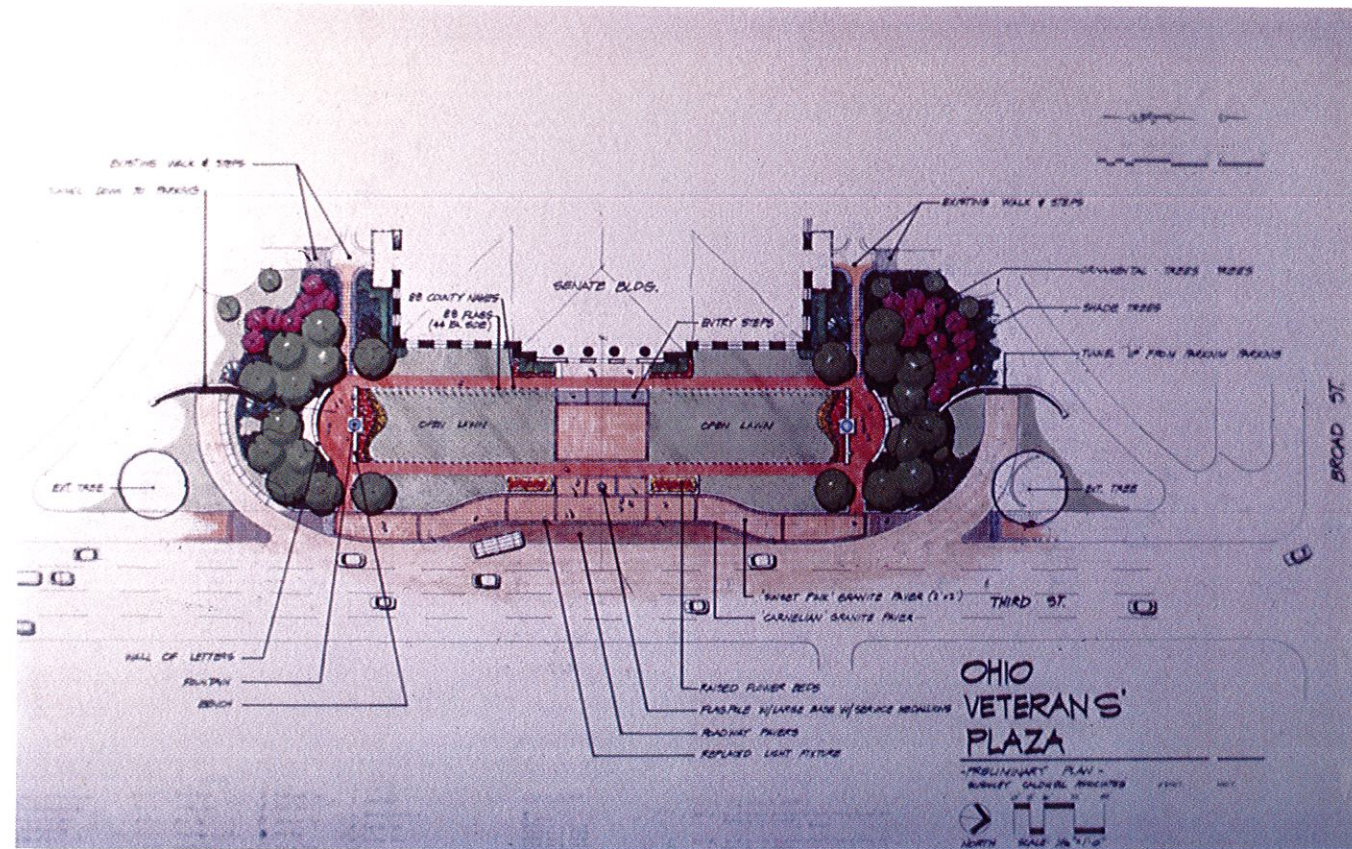

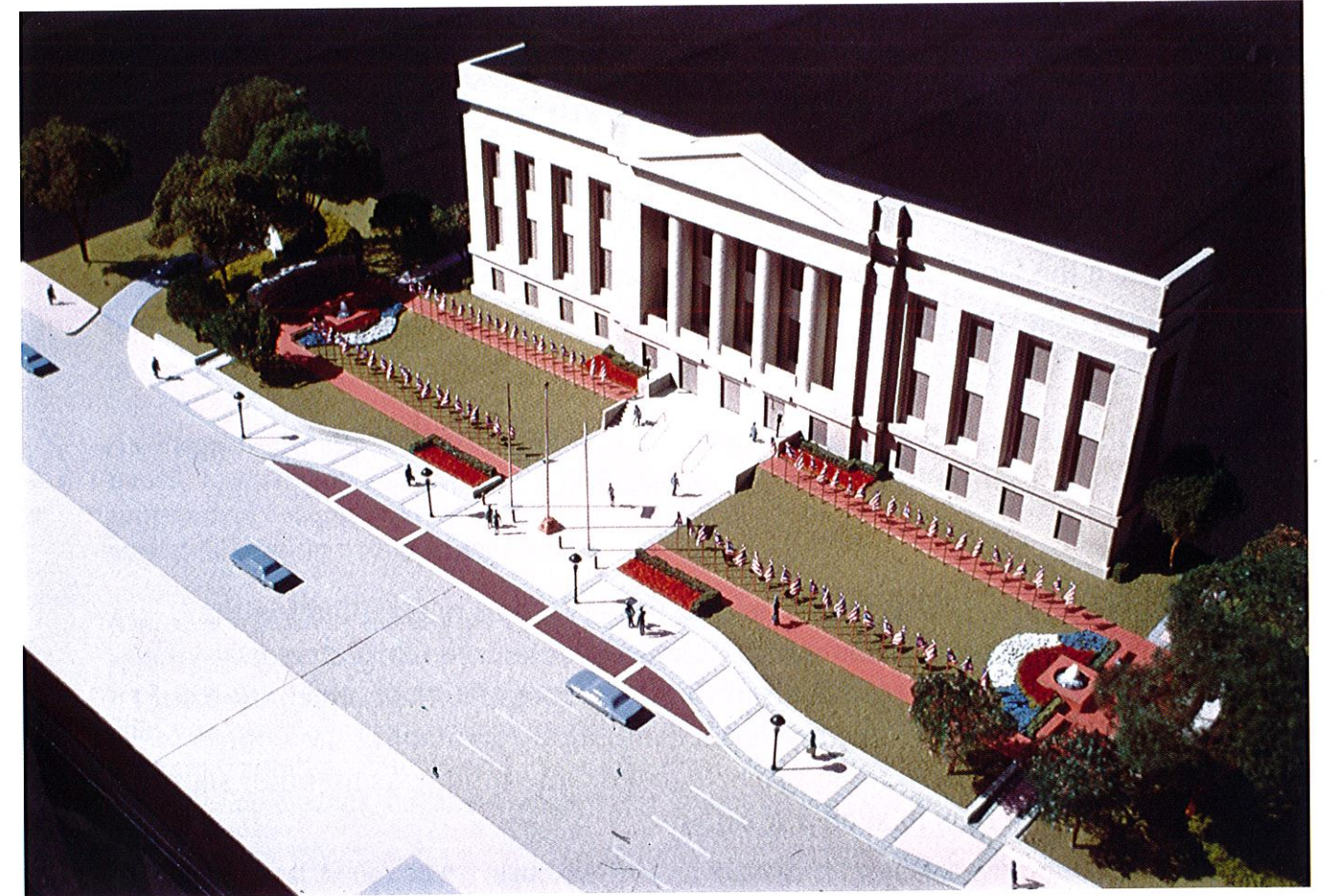

THE OHIO VETERANS PLAZA

THE OHIO VETERANS PLAZA IS LOCATED ADJACENT TO THE EAST FACADE OF THE SENATE BUILDING AT THE OHIO STATEHOUSE IN DOWNTOWN COLUMBUS. IT IS A PUBLIC RECOGNITION OF THE MEN AND WOMEN FROM OHIO WHO SERVED, AND SOMETIMES GAVE THEIR LIVES, IN THE MILITARY SERVICE OF OUR COUNTRY.



DESIGN COMPONENTS OF THE PLAZA INCLUDE TWO CURVED OHIO LIMESTONE WALLS, TEN FEET HIGH AND FORTY FEET LONG, INSCRIBED WITH ACTUAL CORRESPONDENCE SENT HOME TO FAMILY, FRIENDS AND LOVED ONES BY SOLDIERS SERVING IN THE U.S. MILITARY. OTHER FEATURES INCLUDE SMALL FOUNTAINS, INSCRIBED NAMES OF ALL 88 OHIO COUNTIES WITH ACCOMPANYING FLAG HOLDERS FOR CEREMONIAL PURPOSES, AND A LARGE, GRASSY LAWN TO COMMEMORATE THE TRADITIONAL PARADE GROUND ATMOSPHERE. THE DESIGN IS INTENDED TO HONOR ALL MILITARY VETERANS EQUALLY REGARDLESS OF WHEN, WHERE OR WITH WHOM THEY SERVED.


Not since the Doughboy statue was placed on the Statehouse lawn to recognize the veterans of World War I has the state of Ohio paid tribute to its veterans.

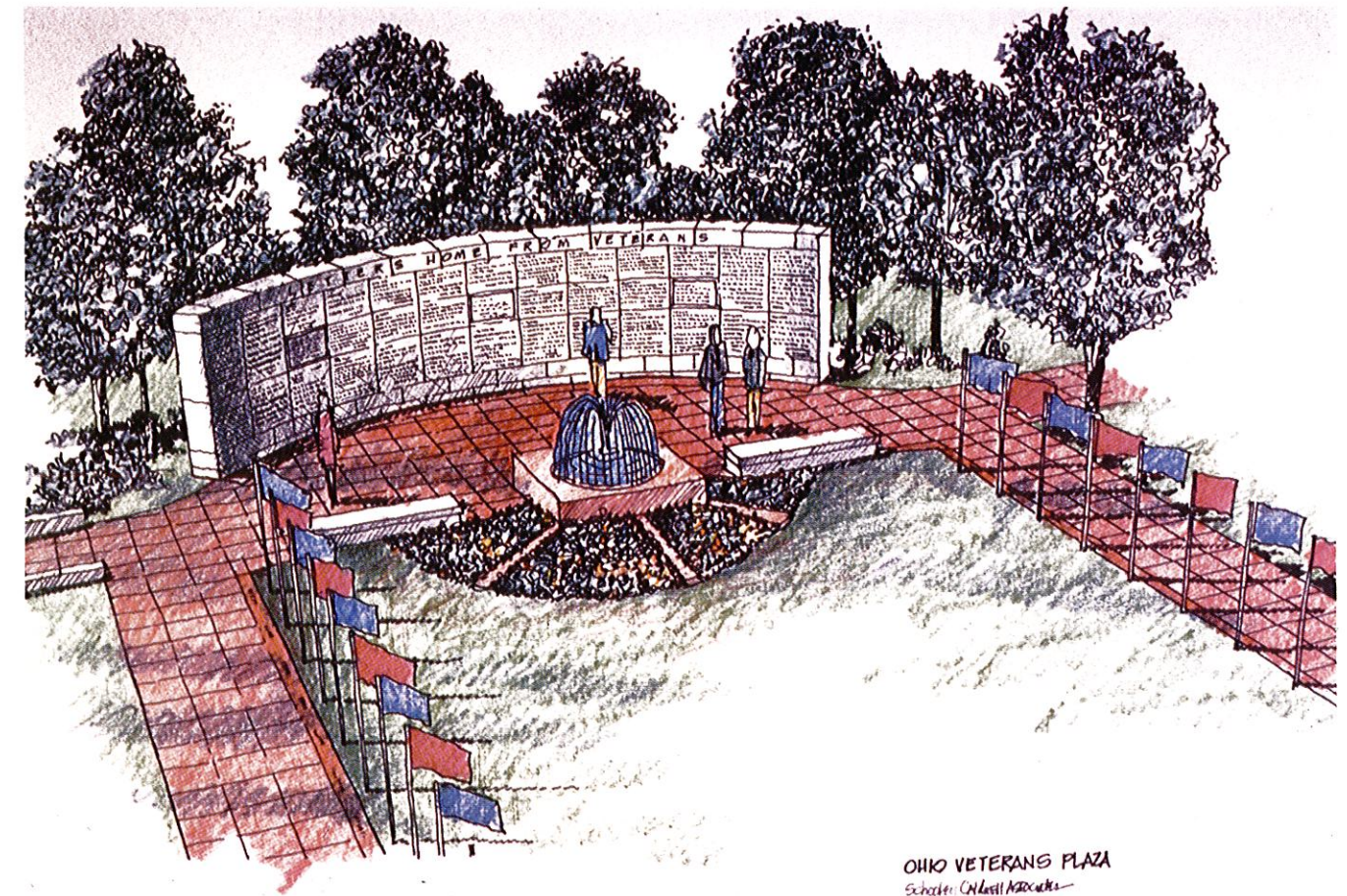
THE STORY OF THE OHIO VETERANS PLAZA

Approximately seventeen years ago, two Vietnam veterans, Carl Chandler and Harry Edwards, discovered that the state of Ohio did not have any type of tribute to those who served in the Vietnam War. So they decided to do something about it. What they did was hand paint a 4x8 ft. sheet of plywood as a tribute to the veterans of the Vietnam war. Once painted, and mind you these gentlemen were not painters or artists, they sneaked onto the Statehouse property one night and erected their "memorial" on the Broad and Third Street corner of the Statehouse lawn. As you can imagine, this was not greeted well by the caretakers of the Statehouse. Legend has it that there was talk that the state was going to have Harry and Carl arrested for trespassing and destruction of state property. Lucky for them, Senator Richard Pfeiffer, also a Vietnam veteran, intervened, and convinced the state officials not only not to press charges against the two midnight raiders, but to allow that hand-painted sign to remain on the Statehouse lawn for a specific period of time.

Shortly thereafter, another Vietnam veteran decided that Harry and Carl had a point; there was not a proper tribute to those who served in Vietnam, so Representative Joe Vukovich introduced legislation to erect a memorial for that service. After the passage of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial legislation, another veteran of the Vietnam war, Senator Eugene Watts, noticed that not only was there not a memorial to Vietnam veterans but that there had not been any tribute to Ohio's veterans since the dedication of the doughboy statue to salute the veterans of WWI. Senator Watts called the veteran community together, with the consent of Senator Pfeiffer and Representative Vukovich, and convinced them that if any memorial should be built, it should pay tribute to all veterans equally - those who served us in the past, the present and the future.

Once new legislation was passed, the veterans community and the state threw out the plans for a Vietnam veterans memorial and busily went to work on plans for an all veterans memorial. A design competition was held, a design was chosen and the project was to start immediately. Then several things happened. One, the state decided to restore the Statehouse, and some of the design elements of the Plaza did not fit the new standards for Statehouse restoration construction. Also, after researching the original design, it was discovered that the maintenance cost for the 88 fountains in that design was over \$100,000 annually, with no assurance that the fountains would hold up during a particularly hard Ohio winter. Last, there was the Oklahoma bombing incident and all governments passed regulations making it illegal to park a vehicle within a certain number of feet from a government building. Since the original design called for a driveway to go around the Plaza right up to the Statehouse, and given the previous problems with the fountain

design, all plans came to a halt and a new design was formulated. That brings us to today's dedication.



The Ohio Veterans Plaza is the last piece in the puzzle of the Statehouse renovation. Its elements of open space and two large fountains appropriately fit the Statehouse design as a place for people to gather, to sit on the lawns and enjoy the history, beauty and architecture that is the Statehouse. The letters home that are a main feature of the Plaza make Ohio's tribute unique. As of the design date, no other memorial tells the story of military service in the soldiers' own words.

The veterans of the state of Ohio will be forever grateful to the citizens of Ohio for this lasting tribute just as the citizens of Ohio will always be grateful to our veterans and their families for the tremendous sacrifice they have made to protect our way of life.

THE ENTERTAINERS

Arnett Howard and the Creole Funk Band One of the most popular bands in the Central Ohio Area. Raised in Plain City, now living in Columbus, Arnett has performed over 3,000 concerts to a variety of audiences in Central Ohio and throughout the world. He is an active community servant and official ambassador of Columbus. Arnett strives to "fill the air with love" and "achieve peace through music."

The Twisters This very high-energy dance group has won awards all over the country. They will compete in Hawaii in December. The group is from West Muskingum High School, Zanesville, Ohio.

The Marksberry Band under the direction of Don Bill This versatile group is from Cincinnati. They have performed at many veterans shows, including the AMVETS national convention. Their style is timeless, covering material from the 40s and 50s up to today. Joining the band are Theresa Marie, Lynn Jacques and Betsy Zimmerman in a fantastic tribute to the Andrews Sisters. This trio is from Columbus and performs for veterans all over the state, including all major WWII 50th anniversary shows.

122nd Army National Guard Band Headquartered in Columbus, it is the official musical organization for the Ohio Army National Guard. Though the Band's primary mission is to promote troop morale, audiences everywhere are moved by its mix of classical, popular and patriotic anthems.

Darla's Dancers This clogging group from Zanesville and McConnellsville represented the United States at the World's Fair in Seville, Spain, in 1992. They also appear at the Miss Ohio pageant. They pride themselves on performing at Governor Voinovich's Inauguration, and they danced at President Clinton's Inauguration in Washington, DC. They volunteer their time and talent at many fairs, hospitals and nursing homes. The group consists of approximately 50 dancers ranging in age from 5 to 18, under the direction of their instructor, **Darla Fox**.

Cleveland Kiltie Band This band was formed 75 years ago in Cleveland by immigrant Scots. Today, its members represent a diverse heritage. The Kilties play for numerous holiday parades and nationality festivals. They played at the Governor Voinovich's Inaugural Luncheon in Columbus.

Worthington Civic Band - formed in 1973 and sponsored by the Worthington Parks and Recreation Department, the band collaborates with junior and senior high school bands to promote life long learning. In addition to local concerts, they have performed in Germany, Austria, Switzerland, France and England.

338th Army Band This all - military band presents a patriotic program mixed with popular tunes.

Sidney Singing Soldiers This 22-member group, comprised solely of WWII and Korean veterans, was organized in the early 1930s by veterans of WWI. The group performs local concerts and at national veterans organization conventions. Their director is Frank Fahrer and the pianist is Mrs. Jane Madden.

The Mistics Two sets of brothers from Cincinnati present a show that will bring back many memories of yesterday's sounds, capped off with today's vibrant music. They bring the Motown sound and the harmonies of today. This group has been performing for over 15 years and has appeared throughout the Midwest.

Johnny Porrazzo Show Originally from Youngstown, Johnny has graced stages from San Francisco to the Caribbean. His stage show is heralded by critics, and he has been the featured performer at the Miss Ohio and Miss Pennsylvania programs. He is currently working on cruise ships and in Atlantic City. He has appeared in many veterans shows in Ohio.

Joining Johnny for this special dedication show is **Shawna Corder** from Newark. She has also performed on cruise ships and at the Miss Ohio program. She is currently working on her record career.

Johnny's special guest for this show will be **Miss Ohio 1999, Cheya Watkins** from Cincinnati. Cheya will compete for the Miss America title in September.

Room 19 This up and coming local alternative rock group tries to stay on the cutting edge of the Central Ohio rock music scene.

THE OHIO VETERANS HALL OF FAME



The Ohio Veterans Hall of Fame was a result of Governor George V. Voinovich's concern about Ohio veterans returning home due to military down-sizing as a result of the end of the cold-war. The Hall of Fame was proposed by former Ohio Bureau of Employment Services' Administrator James Conrad as a special way to recognize the contribution of Ohio's veterans after military service. A special blue ribbon panel of veterans, brought together in 1992 by Governor Voinovich, endorsed the concept of the Ohio Veterans Hall of Fame to increase awareness of the lifetime contributions of Ohio's veterans.

The first ceremony was held in the Statehouse Rotunda on November 5, 1992. Governor Voinovich inducted into the Ohio Veterans Hall of Fame, as charter members, the six Ohio military veterans who were elected president of the United States, and all Ohio Medal of Honor recipients.

The Induction Ceremony is traditionally held annually on the first Thursday in November at The Franklin County Veterans Memorial Auditorium in Columbus, and culminates a process that begins in early March with the solicitation of nominations.

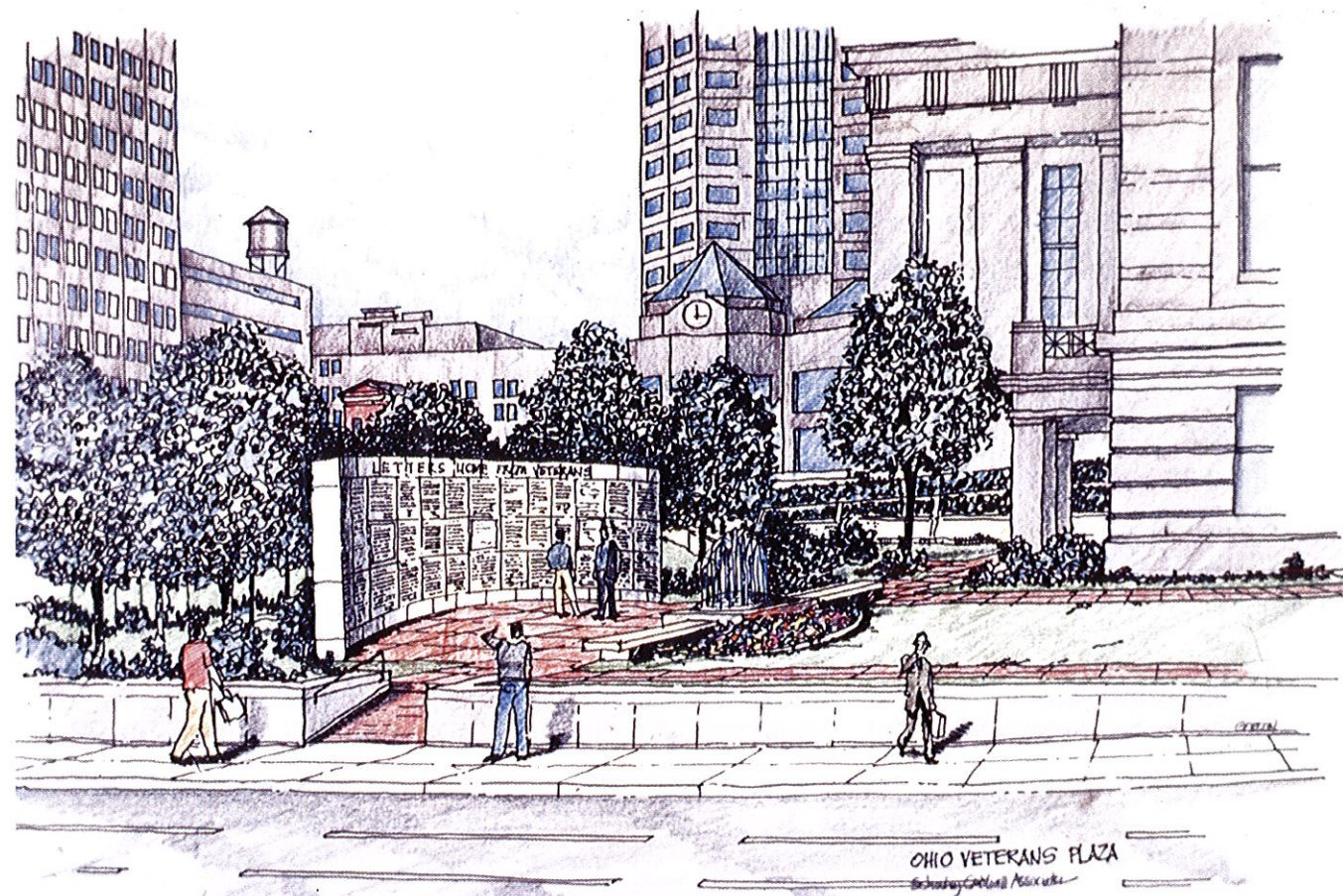
On May 22, 1996, the Ohio Veterans Hall of Fame moved into its permanent home in the I.F. Mack Building on the campus of the Ohio Veterans Home in Sandusky. In addition to the Ohio Veterans Hall of Fame, which features bronze plaques listing inductees and interesting historic items provided by them, the I.F. Mack Building houses an existing collection of unique military artifacts. The enshrinement ceremony takes place annually on the Wednesday before Memorial Day weekend each year in Sandusky.

The Ohio Veterans Hall of Fame is not intended to be a "Military" Hall of Fame. Honorees are recognized for significant contributions at the local, state or national level and for excellence achieved through actions above and beyond the call of duty in their selected field or profession. Significant volunteer work contributions in support of veterans, or the military, will be given consideration. Nominations will be evaluated on the scope and impact of a nominee's achievements, and the extent to which his or her efforts benefit and provide inspiration to others.

There are now over 400 Ohio veterans enshrined in the Ohio Veterans Hall of Fame. Among the inductees are NASA astronauts who were both Ohio natives and military veterans, prominent Civil War veterans, the first Chief of the Ohio Highway Patrol, a former army nurse who is Ohio's only surviving female prisoner of war, one of the legendary Tuskegee Airmen who became a physician and President of Columbus City Council, the creator of the American rubber industry, the co-inventor of a new cancer-detection system, the first woman to lead a national veterans organization, three former Ohio Governors, two Attorneys-General and three U.S. Senators, a man who raised millions of dollars for underprivileged children, a World War II flying ace, a former U.S. Ambassador to India, the only Ohio woman listed on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial, the founder of the Associated Press, the first woman president of the National Agricultural Journalists Association, one of only three women to receive the Distinguished Service Cross in World War I, the founder of the Wright Aeronautical Corporation and Pratt and Whitney Aircraft Company, and the first woman trustee of Baldwin Wallace College, twelve past national commanders of veterans organizations, a retired Army General and community fund drive leader, the pioneer of amputee skiing in America, and the founder of one of the country's largest restaurant companies - just to name a few.

The deadline for submitting nominations is June 30 of each year. A nomination committee of Ohio veteran leaders reviews the nominations and makes recommendations to the Governor. Nomination forms are available from any Ohio Bureau of Employment Services Office or any County Veterans Service Office.
